### Reorganizing & Realigning

#### **Past Activities**

- Increased Academic Efficiency
- Reduced Curricular Complexity
- Reviewed EAB Academic Program Portfolio
- Merged departments and moved programs

#### **Future Direction**

- Three schools will become two units
- Additional departments may be merged, split, or moved into a different unit
- New departments may be created
- Faculty may be moved into different departments

## Reasons to Reorganize

- Student, community, faculty, and institutional support structures are mismatched
  - High-demand programs are unable to accommodate enrollment growth
  - Faculty in fast-growing fields struggle to get support for promising new areas
- Competition for students, federal grants, top faculty, philanthropy, and community partnerships requires the identification of distinctive areas
  - Align program offerings, academic structures, and incentives with areas of institutional distinctiveness
- Align instructional costs with student demand without drastic program cuts



# Unit Heads and Subunit Leads

- Unit Heads: administrative, budgetary, scheduling, and strategic oversight over multidisciplinary units.
- Subunit Leads: elected or appointed to coordinate curricula and serve as shared governance representatives for flexible groupings of faculty in one or more units.



### **Task Force**

- Ensures that faculty, staff, students, and administrators have input into the structure and goals of the reorganization.
- Provides dedicated spaces to discuss and recommend decisions.
- Task force and ad-hoc groups will sunset after tasks are complete.





#### **Examples of Ad-hoc Groups**

- Committee Structure: how will committee representation change in the new structure?
- Promotion and Tenure: how must faculty evaluation adapt for a new organization?
- Academic Unit Evaluation: how will each unit's performance be assessed?
- Student Success: how will the reorganization affect students?
- Administrative Staff: how will administrative staff roles change?
- Process Improvement: what logistical changes need to be made as part of reorganization?



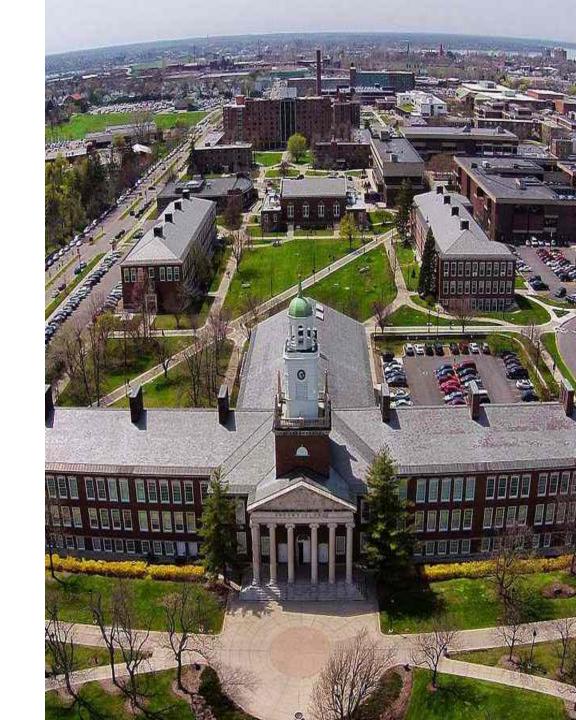
## Reorganization Phases

- **Phase I**: announcement of the upcoming reorganization, solicitation of campus feedback, and creation of task force and ad-hoc groups.
- **Phase II**: faculty-led task force and ad hoc groups recommend the details of the new structure and related processes, determine administrative structure, select and train leadership, and adjust budget.
- **Phase III**: administration and programs are reorganized, transition to new committee structures in units and institution-wide, researching opportunities for additional curricular streamlining and new programs to launch.

## Keep in Mind
